WELCOME TO SCHOOL ©

- This is a huge new adventure!
- Don't underestimate the impact on your child and yourselves
- Be patient
- Be calm
- Let them work it out
- Don't try to work it out for them
 - Listen to them
 - Talk to them

Show confidence that it will be OK

Be confident and positive around your child

Take a little time to settle them in the morning in a positive calm way

If the teaching staff tell you they are fine – They <u>ARE</u> fine!!!

Don't grill them on their day as soon as you pick them up.

Encourage them to talk about things rather than asking them lots of questions about their day at school

Listen to them. Don't try to put 'right' all of the little social skills they are learning

Be understanding of tiredness and anxiety however they choose to show it but be firm and consistent in setting your boundaries

If, <u>after a few weeks</u>, you have any concerns then just check in with a member of the teaching team



Communication and Language

This underpins all seven areas of learning and development.

A language rich environment at home and school is crucial!

We believe in high quality interactions between adults and children at all times.

This can include commenting on their interests, engaging actively in reading stories, echoing back what children say with new vocabulary and giving children the opportunities to share ideas.









Playing! Communication and Language at home

Personal, Social Emotional Development

This area of the curriculum is important to support children's cognitive development and helps them to lead happy and healthy lives.

Positive relationships with all adults enable children to learn how to understand their own feelings and those of others.

Children should be supported to manage emotions, develop a sense of self and have confidence in their own abilities.

Consistent boundaries both at home and school help children to feel safe and secure.

Gross and Fine motor skills.




Using small tools with the support of adults allow children to develop proficiency, control and confidence.

Opportunities for play indoors and outdoors, activities to develop their core strength, stability, balance and spatial awareness, co-ordination and agility.









Mathematics

'Developing a strong ground in number is essential so that all children develop the necessary building blocks to excel mathematically'

It is important to provide children with varied opportunities to apply their understanding of number by using manipulatives such as pebbles and five frames for organising.

Children need to develop a secure base of knowledge and vocabulary which can support a deeper understanding of mathematical concepts.

Literacy

A life long love of reading!

Reading consists of two dimensions:

Language comprehension and word reading

Language comprehension starts from birth. It begins when adults talk with children about the world around them, enjoy songs and rhymes and read books to them.



Word reading requires decoding of printed words.

Writing involves transcription and composition.
